# **ALCOA MEETING**

At the beginning of the month, the Shire met with representatives from Alcoa to discuss their proposal to phase out the ex-gratia payment arrangement to the Shire that had been in place for some 10 years. This meeting was attended by all Waroona Shire Councillors and senior staff, with Alcoa representatives, Simon Pascoe, General Manager of Refining Operations, and Tom Busher, Wagerup Community Relations Manager. I am pleased to say that in addition, we also had the bi-partisan support of Robyn Clarke, MLA for Murray-Wellington and Andrew Hastie, MP, Member for Canning who attended this meeting. Both are to be congratulated for taking the time to show support to our Shire and the community we all represent.

During the meeting we took the opportunity to voice our concerns regarding the adverse impacts that the withdrawal of this funding would have on our ratepayers, particularly in regards to the potential of a rate increase that would be required to make up the short fall that would result if this funding is withdrawn. I am hopeful that this meeting, which was in my opinion both polite and robust, will provide a constructive and positive outcome. Alcoa have



Dr Gordon has firsthand experience in helping many people affected by trauma and grief as a result of a disaster, to understand their ongoing reactions and emotions. Many that I spoke to after the event acknowledged the benefits of listening to Dr Gordon's words.

## BUDGET

It is that time of the year again which sees shire staff involved in the unenviable task of preparing our 2017/18 annual shire budget. This budget is proposed for adoption in early August and will largely be representative of the Corporate Business Plan. All details of the budget will be provided with the Annual Rates Notice.

## **COUNCIL MEETING**

Alcoa/Waroona Sustainability Fund

At the June meeting Council approved a range of funding applications that totalled \$297,331 to various organisations including Waroona Bowling and Social Club Inc. for \$10,387 for the replacement of floor coverings, Quambie Park for \$50,000 for the installation of a generator, Preston Beach Progress Association for \$50,000 for refurbishment of the Community Centre, Waroona Community Men's Shed for \$50,000 for the construction of a Men's Shed, Waroona Visitor Centre for \$22,000 for the replacement of the staircase, Waroona Community Lights for \$21,687 for "Lighting Up Waroona" Stage 2 project, Waroona Senior Citizens for \$18,257 for the upgrade of toilet facilities, Waroona West Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade for \$25,000 for the construction of a fire shed, and Waroona Community Resource Centre Youth Centre for \$50,000 for their co-location project with the Men's Shed.

by all.



## **RECONCILIATION / NAIDOC CELEBRATIONS**

On 22 June the Shire of Waroona in collaboration with Waroona District High School and Waroona Youth Advisory Council, held a cultural showcase event in recognition of National Reconciliation Week and National NAIDOC Week. The event was well attended with nearly 300 students from the school, and approximately 60 members from the community braving the rain to come to the Recreation & Aquatic Centre for a day of recognition and awareness. It was great to see people venturing in from Hamel, Lake Clifton and Preston Beach even though the weather was terrible. Theo Kearing performed the Welcome to Country, which was followed by traditional Aboriginal song, dance and story-telling. There was plenty on offer for all ages including dance workshops, face painting, badge making, colouring in competitions, banner painting, jewellery making, sports activities and inflatable amusements. Several organisations that service the community displayed stalls, providing information and promoting health and education to all in attendance. Lunch time was a much anticipated feature of the day, with many people trying traditional locally made kangaroo stew and damper.



## PEEL MOBILE HEALTH SERVICE TO STAY

The Shire of Waroona has been successful in negotiating a one-off grant from the State Government to enable the Peel Mobile Health Service to continue operating in the region. The bus, which comes to the Waroona Community Resource Centre on a regular basis, has been a great asset to the people of the Waroona Shire assisting with the recovery process following the bushfire of January 2016.

The service, which commenced in 2011/12 services the Mandurah, Waroona and Pinjarra areas and was due to cease at the end of June 2017. The service was provided with further funding to continue until the end of September, and with the grant from the Shire, the service will now be able to operate until the end of June 2018. This will give the State Government ample time to organise future on-going funding of the service.
