SHIRE OF WAROONA GRANT APPROVAL FOR TEA TREE FARMING TRIAL.

In August, Council approved an application for the farming enterprise will likely be extended. the establishment of a 12ha Tea tree farming trial, to harvest Tea tree oils. This project is a part of a larger Peel Development Commission project to establish a new exciting industry in the Peel region with the oil harvested from the trees being processed and adding value to the Western Australian Food Innovation Precinct.

The property located on the corner of Coronation and Fawcett Road was chosen due to its ability to draw on the Harvey Water network. If successful the developers Manukalife have indicated

Manukalifewillbeinvesting\$1 millionintotheinitial trail, with planting to commence early in October with the first harvest expected within 24 months.

Shire President, Michael Walmsley said the success of the trial will result in the creation of a new exciting agricultural opportunity for land owners in Waroona, providing the ability to diversify their crops, and was pleased to hear the developers are intending to source their equipment and labour locally where possible.
